RELIGIOUS ARCHITECTURE AND ISLAMIC CULTURES

This course introduces the history of Islamic cultures through the perspective of their architecture of devotion (religious, commemorative, and educational). The survey proceeds chronologically from the beginning of Islam in 7thcentury Arabia up to the pres-It examines decisive moments in Islamic history, traces the global spread of Islam today, and introduces influential patrons, thinkers, and designers. Major examples of mosques, madrasas, khangahs, mausolea, etc. are situated within their broadest historical context and their architectural, urban, and stylistic characteristics are analyzed in conjunction with their political, socioeconomic, and intellectual settings. Students are encouraged to raise questions and generate debates. The aim is to help better understand Islamic religious architecture within its regional, pan-Islamic, and global contexts both in the past and present.
